



Marginalized communities face significant challenges in navigating a complex healthcare system that demands strong health literacy skills for achieving comprehensive care.

Without adequate application of relevant health information, these communities are at risk of poorer health outcomes, increased healthcare costs, and missed opportunities to prevent disease.





"The degree to which individuals have the capacity to obtain, process and understand [the] basic health information and services needed to make appropriate health decisions (Coughlin et. al, 2020)"







#### **Abstract**


Access to and utilization of healthcare are distinct, yet related, concepts that serve as a focus for health policy and quality improvement. This article identifies their similarities and differences, calling on previous research and reviews to elaborate on a current understanding of factors that influence both, with a particular focus on those related to the healthcare provider. Access describes an individual's ability to position oneself to receive healthcare services. Utilization presumes access and includes the formulation of a healthcare plan during a healthcare encounter and its subsequent implementation. We present a framework that envisions access and utilization as aspects of healthcare delivery that may be affected by the context within which services are delivered, the structure of the practice that delivers them and other processes leading to outcomes experienced by the healthcare consumer. Based on current trends, we anticipate that research and policy related to access and utilization over the next 5 years will be primarily driven by a focus on quality improvement. Providers are positioned to use their collective authority to exercise influence on access and quality at the individual, institutional and policy levels.

# How to be a Driver of Healthcare Utilization?

"Limited literacy is a barrier to accessing health information, proper medication use, and utilization of preventive services" of Preventive Services (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services).


"Low health literacy [is associated with] higher medical costs, increased visits to the emergency room... and less use of preventative services" (Barczy, 2021).

### Which Communities?



Nearly 40% of American adults—60 million people—have limited health literacy.

Of these, almost 32 million are nonwhite and/or Hispanic.



# Low health literacy is linked to:



Increased visits to emergency room



Increased hospital stays



Less likely to follow treatment



### **Estimated Costs**

#### Venue

• School Gym Rental: \$500

#### Equipment & Supplies

- Tables (10 @ \$20 each): \$200
- Chairs (50 @ \$5 each): \$250
- Audio/Visual Equipment (rental): \$300

# How do we measure the Corewell Academy's effectiveness?

- Quality Improvement: collecting data to measure for consistency and fidelity
  - Performance testing: baseline, benchmark testing

- **Stakeholder Engagement:** Regularly review metrics with stakeholders to ensure relevance and accuracy
  - Community-based Participatory Research: motivational interviews, focus groups, surveys, etc



### **Key Metrics**

#### From Corewell:

**Emergency Room (ER) Utilization Rate:** Number of ER visits per 1,000 community members per month.

**ER Revisit Rate:** Percentage of patients who return to the ER within 90 days after discharge.

**Hospital Length of Stay:** Average length of hospital stay in days for community members.

**Tytocare Utilization:** Increase in the use of Tytocare from baseline, measured by the number of Tytocare sessions per month.

**Virtual Appointment Frequency:** Number of virtual health appointments per 1,000 community members per month.

#### From the Communities:

Likelihood of using virtual healthcare services

Amount of learned applicable information

Confidence in using featured technologies (e.g., MyChart, Tytocare)

Change in health literacy levels assessed through standardized health literacy surveys before and after the program.

Changes in specific health outcomes (e.g., control of chronic conditions like diabetes and hypertension) tracked over time.


